Cosmetology 10

Cosmetology Studies focuses on personal and professional grooming, body care, and enhancement practices, and provides students opportunities to explore and prepare for cosmetology-related career options.

This course will introduce the students to personal grooming practices and safety, as well as basic hair styling tools and techniques used to create a variety of hair styles with thermal styling, braiding designs, shampoos, roller sets and comb outs. They will also learn the applications of basic facial treatment techniques and perform basic skin care practices while gaining a better understanding of professional skin care and make-up products.

Marking Scheme:

The marking scheme for cosmetology will focus on both theoretical and practical components. Students will need to successfully complete all components of a module before moving on to another module.

The following modules will be offered this semester for Cosmetology 10 students:

COS 1010: PERSONAL & PROFESSIONAL PRACTICES

Prerequisite: None

 Students develop increased appreciation for the significance of personal grooming in various life situations, as well as the knowledge and skills required to maintain a personal health and safety plan

COS 1020: LONG HAIR DESIGN I

Prerequisite: COS1010: Personal & Professional Practices I credit

• Students handle hair confidently, brush, comb and part hair correctly and create ropes, knots and two- or three-strand braids.

COS 2010: LONG HAIR DESIGN 2

Prerequisite: COS1020: Long Hair Design 1

 Students use photos or other images as guides to recreate a variety of hair designs using long hair techniques.

EST 1020: SKIN CARE PRACTICES

Prerequisite: COS1010: Personal & Professional Practices I credit

• Students identify the basic structures and functions of the skin.

Students analyze skin and perform basic skin care practices, including cleansing, toning, nourishing and protecting.

Each cosmetology module will involve a written component (module booklets, assignments, etc.), labs, and assessments. The following general timeline will be followed as closely as possible to achieve course goals.

GENERAL EXPECTATIONS
